

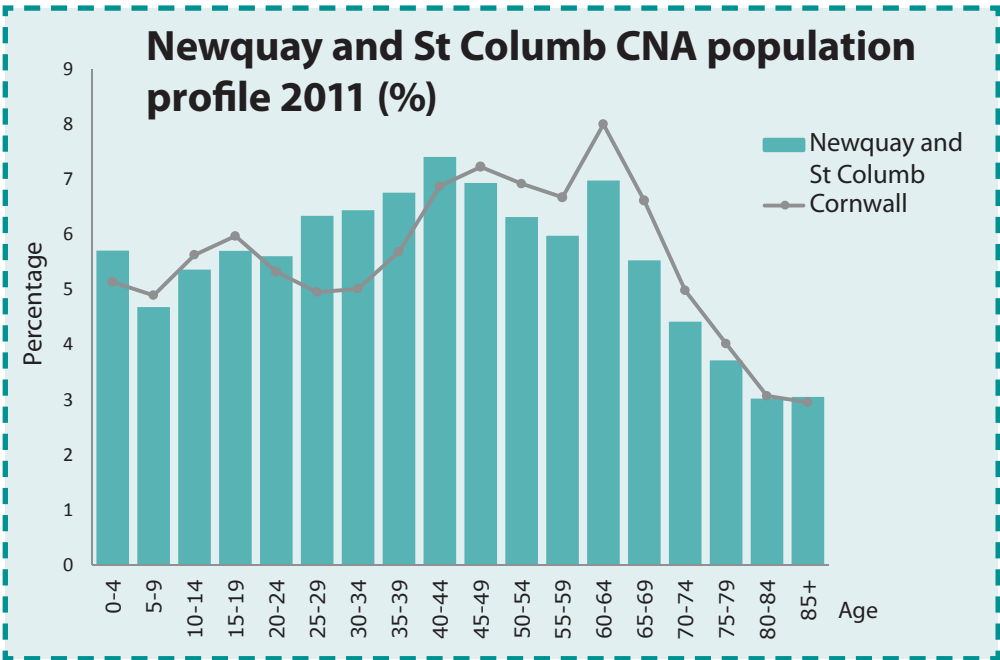
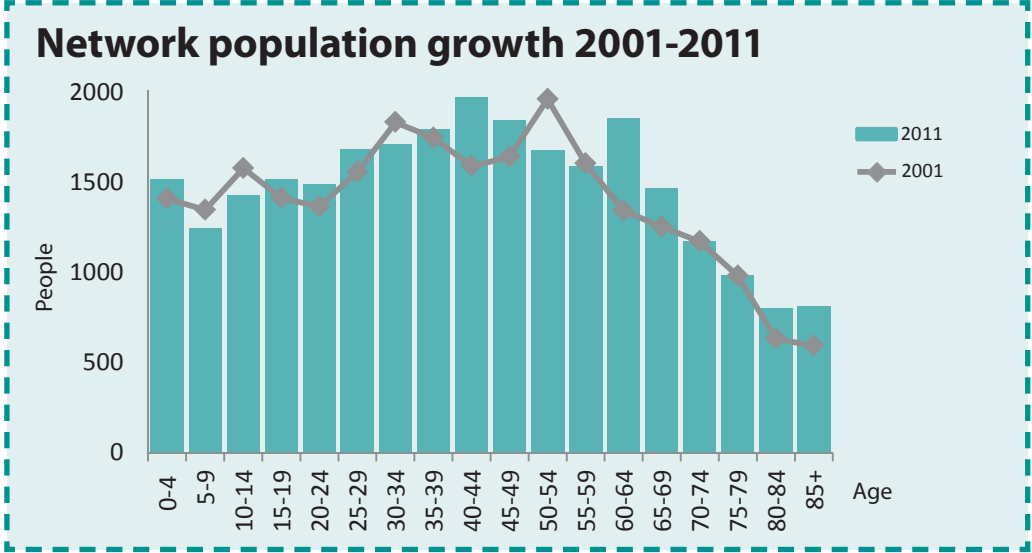
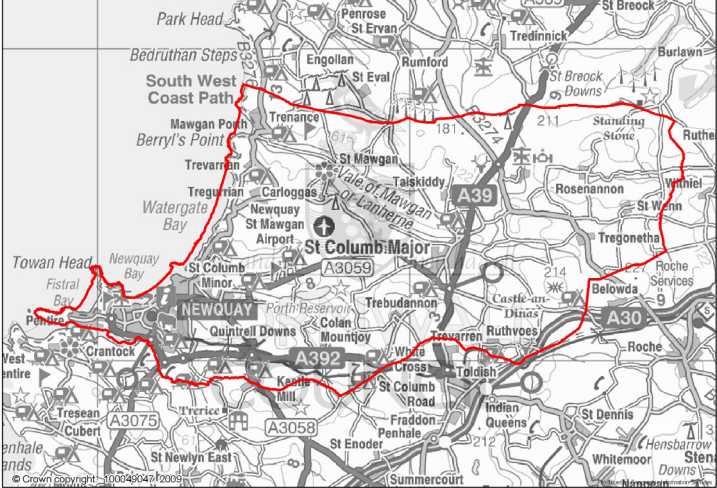
Newquay and St Columb Community Network

This document sets out headline figures for the Newquay and St Columb Community Network Area (CNA) highlighting how it compares to Cornwall across a variety of topics. Community network figures have been built from neighbourhood data. Availability of parish data is limited.

Population facts and figures (Census 2011)



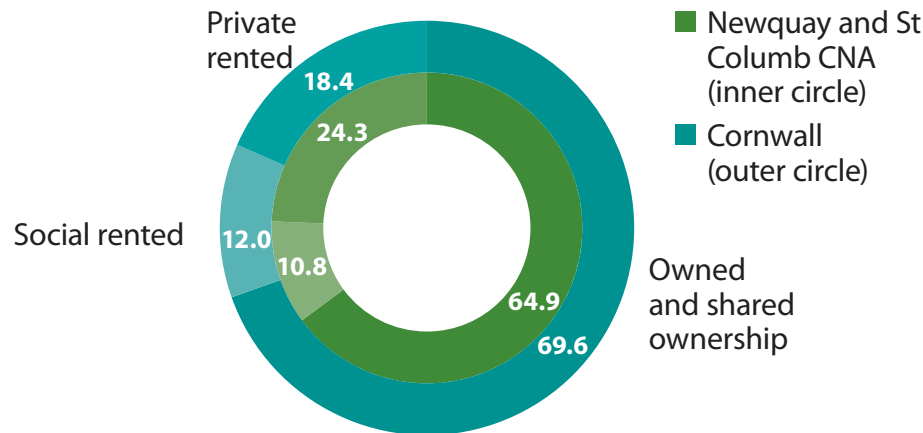
Newquay and St Columb Community Network has 26,612 residents; 5% of Cornwall's total population. The workday population is 25,758 so 854 people (net) commute out of the network to work.



Throughout this document we make reference to 'neighbourhoods'. These are small geographical areas which have between 1,000 and 3,000 people living in them. They are defined by the Office of National Statistics (ONS) and sometimes called Lower Super Output Areas (LSOA).



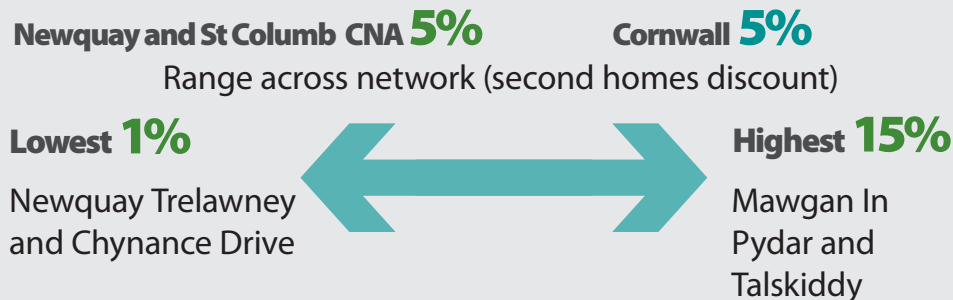
Home ownership (%) (Census 2011)



1,231 households live in social rented housing in the Newquay and St Columb CNA which is lower (10.8%) than the Cornwall average (12%) as shown in the chart left. The range across the neighbourhoods is highest (16%) in St Columb Minor North (197 properties) and lowest (0.7%) in Quintrell Downs and Colan (9 properties).

7,387 homes are owned or shared ownership (64.9%) compared with 69.6% average in Cornwall. The range across the neighbourhoods shows the highest concentration (8.1%) is Porth and Watergate Bay (602 properties) and the lowest is (4.1%) Newquay Narrowcliff (301 properties).

Homechoice is the register to apply for social housing vacancies and affordable housing in Cornwall. This information is intended as a guide only. Data includes only those currently living in Cornwall. Some people may require a connection to a local area and may not be eligible for housing.

In the 12 months to March 2014, there were 69 social housing lets completed in the Newquay and St Columb Community Network.

Single person households (%) (Census 2011)

The number of adults living alone is increasing as lifestyles change and people live longer. This can contribute to housing demand.

Community Safety 01/04/2013 - 31/03/2014 (Devon and Cornwall Constabulary)

Newquay has been identified as a priority town by Safer Cornwall. Crime and disorder levels are highly seasonal, falling below other large towns in Cornwall outside the summer months. 85% of recorded crime in the Newquay network occurs within the Newquay town boundary. The volume of crime has seen a slight reduction in both the network area and the town when compared with the previous financial year.

Average adult life expectancy in Cornwall

Life expectancy in Cornwall is generally good by national standards. Newquay and St Columb CNA experience a significant range across the network, with men in the worst neighbourhoods living up to 4 years less than the Cornwall average.

Deprivation (Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) 2010, HMRC 2012/13)

5.5% of people in the Newquay and St Columb Community Network live in a highly deprived area (in the top 20% most deprived in England) compared with an average of 9.8% across Cornwall. 18.6% of children aged under 16 in Newquay and St Columb CNA are living in poverty compared with 18.1% across Cornwall.

Not every person in a highly deprived area will themselves be deprived. Equally, there will be some deprived people living in the least deprived areas.

There is variation across the Network with some areas ranked as more deprived than others. The following neighbourhood is ranked in the top 20% most deprived in England:

- Newquay Town Centre

People in deprived areas are more likely to have a lower life expectancy and spend more of their life in poor health, having higher illness and disease levels.

Healthy weight (National Child Measurement Programme 2012/13 and QOF

Disease Register 2012/13)

18.1% of children leaving primary school in Newquay and St Columb CNA are obese, while a further 15.2% are classed as overweight. This compares with an average of 16.3% obese and 14.7% overweight across Cornwall and Isles of Scilly.

Figures for adult obesity are not available by community network. GP clinical registers for Cornwall indicate 13.4% of patients aged 16 and over were obese (BMI of 30 or over).

Natural and cultural assets (Cornwall Council July 2014)

There is a wealth of archaeological sites along the coastal section of this network including a number of Bronze Age barrows, and Iron Age cliff castles such as Trevelgue Head. St Columb is a medieval market town which, at one point, was considered as the location for Cornwall's cathedral. RAF St Mawgan, now partly in use by Newquay Airport, was first established as a civilian airfield in 1933 and includes significant military heritage assets dating from WWII and the Cold War. The land above Watergate Bay, Trevelgue Head and Lusty is listed as an AGHV¹.

Neighbourhood development plans (Cornwall Council July 2014)

There are no neighbourhood development plans in place for this network.

There are no assets listed as an Asset of Community Value within the Newquay and St Columb network.

Employment by sector

Newquay and St Columb Community Network has double the amount of people in accommodation and food services (18.9%) than the Cornwall average (9.5%). There are also slightly more people working in construction than the Cornwall average.

Economic activity

There are more unemployed people (4.4%) in the Newquay and St Columb network than the Cornwall average (3.3%). There are also less retired people (16%) in the network compared to the Cornwall average (18.9%), which is reflected in the younger population profile shown in the graph on page 1.

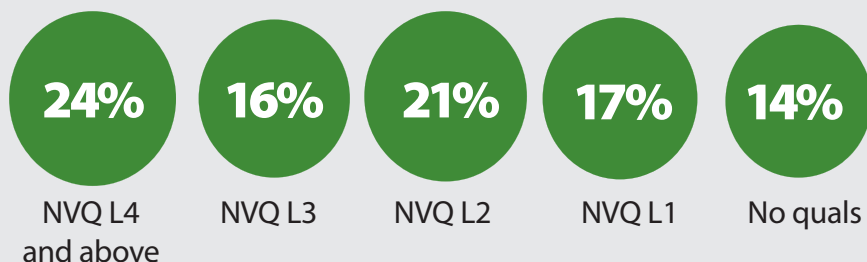
An estimated 3.8% of young people aged 16-19 are not in education, employment or training in the CNA, compared to the Cornwall average of 3% (March 2014).

Qualifications

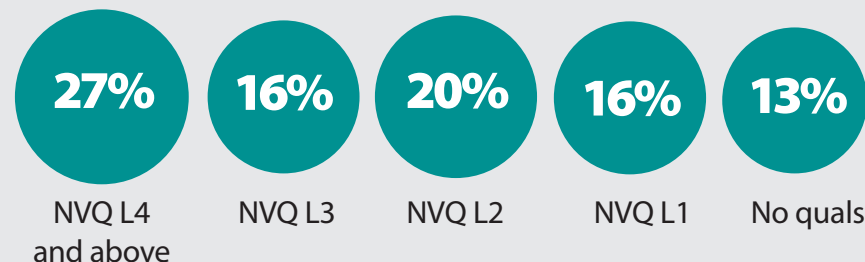
There are less people (aged 16+) with NVQ Level 4 qualifications (degree or equivalent) in the Newquay and St Columb network. There are also slightly more people with NVQ Level 1 (GCSE D-G) or with no qualifications in the network area than the Cornwall average.
